WHAT ARE WE?

Program Spotlight: Youth In Care

In-School Mentoring

Children who receive care from the child welfare system experience some very real and challenging barriers. Their safety, security and emotional health and wellbeing are top of mind. Their lives, and the lives of their families, can be complicated and difficult.

It is not unusual for children who are in the care of the Children's Aid Society to access our programs at Big Brothers Big Sisters of London and Area. However, until 2014 there had never been a conversation about the unique needs and strengths of these children.



As our team learned more about trauma and how that impacts children's capacity to connect and create healthy relationships a question emerged:

What if we could create a special mentoring program designed to address the unique barriers and challenges experienced by children who are receiving support from the Children's Aid Society of London & Middlesex?

From this question we responded by creating the Youth In Care: In-School Mentoring Program. We took our nationally launched school based mentoring program and added new and dynamic elements to make the program more accessible and easy to manage for children who were getting supports from child welfare. This included recruiting 'super' volunteers who could invest a minimum of two years, ensuring volunteers could follow children if they had to move schools through London-Middlesex, delivering comprehensive trauma-informed training and support meetings and,

> most excitingly, formally connecting and working with the Children's Aid Society of London & Middlesex to reach the most vulnerable of children.

> Last year our pilot project ended. Over the course of two years we created more than 20 matches for these children. At the end the results were in- this program was not only in demand, it was working. Feedback from schools and mentors was that students were coming back to class more settled and ready to learn. Stability had given mentees a sense of connection and the weekly visits were an incentive to attend class. Mentors shared about the growth they saw in their mentees and in the power of their connections.

We are thrilled to share that the Youth in Care: In-School Mentoring program is no longer a pilot, but a part of our menu of services. We look forward to our continued partnership with the Children's Aid Society of London & Middlesex.

Power of Golf Fore Charity



Community Based Programs

Community Based Programs are our traditional 1:1 mentoring. Big Brothers/Big Sisters provide young men/women with a role model to talk to and share the experiences of growing up with. Through regular outings, a relationship is developed between the mentor and the mentee, which is built on trust and common interests, and is supported by our experienced case-workers. The result is a life-changing experience for both the mentor and the mentee.

School Based Programs

School Based Programs consist of In-School Mentoring, Go Girls! and Game On!, all which take place within schools in the Thames Valley District.

The In-School mentoring program provides youth with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up within school grounds. For one hour a week, mentors meet with their mentee and engage in activities such as board games, crafts or just hang out on school grounds.

Go Girls! and Game On! are group mentoring programs for youth 12-14 that focus on physical activity, balanced eating and self-esteem. The goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of the youth by helping them build a positive self-image – setting them on a path to reach their full potential in life.













Ethno-Racial Youth Mentoring Program (ERYM)

ERYM is a mentoring program for newcomer youth between the ages of 9 and 13 and is designed to engage and slowly develop relationships of trust, where resiliency of youth and families can be celebrated. ERYM honours, respects and works with the realities that youth and families face as they transition into the Canadian culture.



In addition to working with newcomer youth, ERYM also engages the mothers of the youth through mentoring relationships to assist them with their own adaptation process. Mother mentors provide one-on-one companionship and support for mothers of youth participants. The goal is that mother mentors can assist their mentees in understanding not only their own adaptation process but also their children's integration to the Canadian context.


Both components consist of monthly group activities and one-on-one connections between mentors and mentees. Mentors and mentees are introduced during the monthly group

activities to see if youth and mothers connect with a mentor. There is no paper matching involved.


TREASURER'S REPORT

Expenses



Big Brothers Big Sisters of London and Area is a community supported organization that raises funds from many different sources in order to meet the expanding needs of the children and families we support throughout London and its surrounding communities. As demand for our services increases, so does the need to increase our funding. Our primary funding sources include the generous support of United Way of London & Middlesex, the City of London, successful fundraising events, individual and corporate donations, as well as program development and enhancement grants from community and philanthropic foundations.

This past fiscal year we saw a large increase in the amount received from the Rock the Park music festival and we also saw increases in donations from our corporate donors. At the same time, we did face some financial challenges as some third-party fundraisers from previous years were discontinued or moved in a different direction. As expected, there was a decrease in our fundraising events revenue due to having two of our Big Bash galas within the same fiscal year last year. Overall, our agency incurred a deficit of \$93,030 which was somewhat mitigated by the surplus of \$35,111 recorded the previous year.

We were able to increase the amount invested in our endowment fund through legacy gifts from generous long-standing donors. Donations to our endowment fund provide a perpetual income to BBBSOLA and help to ensure the sustainability of our services for future generations.

At BBBSOLA, we look for ways to provide our programs more efficiently and try to find savings wherever possible that will not affect the quality of our service delivery. As the need for our services in the communities we serve continues to grow, we are continuously exploring our funding relationships with existing and new partners in order to raise the funds required to meet those needs.
