# Our strategic update

We entered year one of our strategic plan refresh and remain focused on three key pillars:

# B uilders I impact G rowth

BUILDERS (Our people): This year, we created the opportunity for our board members and staff to engage in a diversity training workshop led by two of our board members. We supported the staff team at BBBSOLA as we said goodbye to and welcomed new staff. We held an open house in November of 2022, where we had the opportunity to showcase our new office space and to host our volunteers, donors, partners and general community members.

IMPACT (Our purpose): We continue to lean into our theory of change and are excited to share some of the ways research demonstrates that mentorship matters and the work we do is truly making a difference.

# A YEAR OF CONNECTION

### Mentorship Matters

#### **BBBS Theory of Change**

The Big Brothers Big Sisters Theory of Change continues to serve as our movement's North Star, creating a unified path on how we make change in the world. At BBBSOLA, the Theory of Change drives our decision-making, helps to promote our work, and strengthens our culture.

The Theory of Change spells out <u>who</u> we serve, <u>how</u> we serve them and <u>what</u> impact we make.

#### WHO DO WE SERVE?

Young people who face adversity and are in need of an additional consistent and supportive developmental relationship.

#### HOW DO WE IGNITE POTENTIAL?

By creating the space for a mentor and mentee to build a developmental relationship that expresses care, encourages growth, provides support, shares power, and expands possibilities.

By providing 1:1 mentoring services that:

- Intentionally recruit volunteers based on the needs of young people in our community
- Match young people with a professionally screened volunteer mentor
- Monitor and support the match with a professional caseworker
- Graduate the match relationship to natural supports

By offering the following school group mentoring programs:

- Go Girls! (for girls in grades 6-8)
- Game On! (for boys in grades 6-8)

#### WHAT IS THE IMPACT?

- Greater social emotional competence
- Improved mental health & well-being
- Increased educational engagement


### OUR YOUTH IN 2022

Youth need us now, more than ever. Coming out of the pandemic, connection and positive relationships are critical to supporting youth to overcome adversity and achieve their potential.

The statistics are staggering. According to surveys:

- 60% of youth are living in a home with mental illness
- 32% of youth are close to someone who is incarcerated
- 90% of youth have experienced bullying
- 78% of families we work with are experiencing financial stress

The good news? We know mentorship works.

EXPAND POSSIBILITY







Many of our littles represent equity-deserving populations and live in low-income households. We know that Indigenous people, racialized communities, immigrants and refugees, persons with disabilities, and people who identify as 2SLGBTQIA+ are disproportionately represented in under-served communities.

Research shows that youth with consistent and positive developmental relationships with adults help youth to grow, thrive and reach their potential. The data is clear, mentorship matters.

#### HAPPINESS. CONFIDENCE. CONNECTION.

Youth with access to strong developmental relationships are:

- 60% more likely to report feeling consistently happy
- 45% more likely to report feeling consistently confident
- 50% more likely to have a strong social network

### The Fred J. Watkins Scholarship Program Fred's Story



Fred Watkins passed away three years ago, in his 93rd year.

Fred spent his career as an accountant, although he wanted to be a doctor. His parents did not have the financial means to send him to medical school, and this became the driving force behind Fred's philanthropic work.

Leading up to Fred's final years, he had conversations with his partner Ralph, about what type of legacy he wanted to leave. Fred decided that he wanted to support youth through postsecondary education who wouldn't otherwise have the opportunity to do so, and so the Fred J. Watkins foundation was born.

Since its creation, Ralph had been searching for an organization to collaborate with to bring Fred's vision to life. As a former Big Brother of St. Thomas-Elgin, Ralph's son Rick suggested that he approach our organization as our values and mission aligned with what they were looking to accomplish. After a few important meetings and conversations, the scholarship at our agency was established. We are fortunate to have Ralph Topp as a supporter, donor advisor and dear friend to lead with heart, generosity and purpose to help fulfill Fred's vision and our goal to ignite potential in youth.



A heartfelt thank you to the McEachern family for this meaningful contribution to our mission!



Thanks to the generosity of our donors, supporters, partners and sponsors we are ending the year in a healthy financial position.




